A Whole New World Kind of Truth

Some of you might remember TrinFest Sunday, when I preached on Genesis 9. That Sunday, I did some dancing, sweating, the Praise Band praised and we had treats and face paint.

I asked you to think about your favorite Disney movie as a kid. If you were listening closely, you may have noticed I never actually circled back to it — I preach without notes, and somewhere between the flood and the finish, I lost that particular thread. So consider this part two.

Here's what I was getting at. I don't believe the story of Noah's flood is historically true — I don't think it happened exactly the way it's described, water covering every mountain, animals loading up two by two. But I believe the *TRUTH* in that story completely. And those are two different things. Historically accurate and true aren't the same, even though we often treat them like they are.

To make the point, I wanted us to think about Disney movies, because we already know how to hold both of those at once without it being a crisis of faith.

Mine was *Aladdin*. I grew up on the lower-income side of things — my dad had been diagnosed with MS and money was tight. I remember one Christmas, my sister and I were on the receiving end of something like Toys for Tots. So a story about a "street rat" who didn't have much of anything, and turned out to be worth infinitely more than his circumstances suggested? That landed somewhere in me before I could express why.

None of Aladdin is historically true. There was no genie, no magic carpet, no monkey turned into an elephant. And yet — the truths in it are real ones. People have hopes and dreams bigger than the box the world tries to put them in. Nobody wants to stay confined to what they've been told they are. Help shows up in the most unexpected places. And to be truly loved is to stop pretending to be someone you're not — to actually *be* yourself.

How God Meets Us Now: Rethinking Reformation Sunday

We celebrate the Reformation on the last Sunday of October. If you grew up Lutheran,

Reformation Sunday might mostly mean wearing red and singing "A Mighty Fortress". But Reformation isn't just a history lesson about a monk and a church door. It's what God has been doing all along. God started with the whole cosmos, then narrowed in on one ordinary family, then came close in the person of Jesus, and now keeps showing up through an imperfect, beautiful Church. God has never stopped reforming how God meets us.

So maybe the question isn't "What did Luther believe?" It's "What do we believe, and why?" Is it a reflection of the living Christ, or just what's comfortable and been that way? That's not a scary question. It's a faithful one.

Nobody watches Aladdin and says, "well, none of that happened, so I guess I got nothing out of it." We already know how to let a story be historically inaccurate and deeply true at the same time. We do it every time we watch a movie or read a novel that moves us.

That's exactly how I'd invite you to read Genesis. It's not a science report on ancient rainfall totals. It's a story that tells us who God is — a God who grieves over what's broken in the world, and who responds not by demanding something from us, but by making an unconditional promise to stay. That's the truth I want you walking away with. Not whether the math on the boat adds up. Whether you believe God has bound himself to you, rain or shine.

So — what was your Disney movie? And what truth is God speaking to you through it?

The Table Is Open

When Nicholas was very little, he'd get a present, tear off the wrapping paper, and exclaim, "It's a box!!!" He was thrilled. Not about what was inside — about the box. My mother-in-law, who is a little further along than Nicholas, loves the look of a present. For her, everything on the outside matters, almost more than what's inside. The wrapping, the bow — you know a present is from her because it's gorgeous.

Same gift. Two completely different ways of receiving it. Neither one of them is doing it wrong.

I bring that up because we're making a change here at Trinity, and I want you to know the "why" behind it before you hear the "what."

Here's the truth: neither a 3-year-old nor a 93-year-old fully understands what's happening at that Table. The body of Christ: present in, with, and under a piece of bread — I've got a seminary degree and I still can't fully explain that one to you. None of us can. It's mystery, not math.

We live in a world that's awfully good at sorting people into in and out, winners and losers, enough and not-enough. Christ's table doesn't run on that system.

But here's what both of them do understand, without any theology at all. A 3-year-old and a 93-year-old both know exactly what it feels like to be included. And they both know exactly what it feels like to be left out. When they are welcome somewhere and when they are not. That's not complicated. That's just being human.

We live in a world that's awfully good at sorting people into in and out, winners and losers, enough and not-enough. Christ's table doesn't run on that system. It never has. Jesus didn't say "let the children come to

me once they've studied up." He said, "Let the children come to me." So — we're going to let them come.

Which brings us to the what.

What's actually changing. Communion at Trinity will now be open to any baptized person who comes to the table, no matter their age or how much theology they've got sorted out in their head. This is standard practice at many ELCA congregations, and our council just voted to support it, in line with ELCA guidance. How it'll actually work. The person serving communion is going to ask a simple question of a kid coming forward: "Can they receive?" If the hands are open, communion is given. If they're not, the child receives a blessing instead. Nobody is put on the spot. Nobody has to pass a test. It's just: are your hands open? Okay. Here you go.

We're not dropping the other stuff. We'll still offer our communion retreat for kids, and we'll still celebrate that first time a child comes to the table on purpose, understanding a little more of what's happening. That milestone still matters. This isn't instead of that — it's alongside it.

If you've got questions about this, I would genuinely love to talk with you. Come find me, call me, corner me at coffee hour, whatever works. Grace isn't something we grow into. It's something we're handed. Open hands and all.
